Foreword from our Director

The aberrant and the abhorrent became the norm in 2024, compelling us to face the ugly reality that media freedom, justice and the sanctity of civilian life have been eroded, even in ostensibly democratic societies.

staggering, almost incomprehensible. Data compiled for Killing the Messenger by the Cardiff School of Journalism showed that 81 of the 145 journalists who died around the world were from Gaza.

To get a real sense of scale, in a country the size of Britain, this would equate to over 2,500 journalist deaths in a year.

and safety sphere we raised our voices throughout the year about the depth of these injustices and the magnitude of their impact, not only on the victims and their families but on society at large.

Journalists are vital witnesses to war crimes and atrocities, meaning silencing them is an attack on truth itself. Without them, violence and injustice can more easily be perpetrated on us all, a message that has failed to resonate with Western governments. Their deafening silence in the face of Israel's relentless killing and targeting of media workers has shattered moral thresholds and marked a point of no return.

But it will not prevent us from mourning and celebrating our colleagues, whose selfless commitment to report the facts is an inspiration to us all.

We have named every single one of our colleagues who was killed in 2024, not only from Gaza but also from Sudan, Syria, Lebanon, Bangladesh, Pakistan, of us.

he death toll among journalists in Gaza was Mexico, Ukraine, Colombia, Myanmar, Iraq, India, DRC, Haiti, Honduras, Cambodia, Chad, Indonesia, Russia, and Somalia.

> This year's report also features a series of moving portraits of journalists created by the artist and illustrator Gianluca Costantini, whose portraiture of those killed in Gaza is here accompanied by journalists killed across continents.

"My portraits", Gianluca says, "stand as a rejection Along with our colleagues in the media freedom of the attempts to erase these journalists' legacy, affirming the significance and dignity of their lives and work. I aim to capture their essence and individuality as a reminder that behind every name lies a story, a family and a commitment to the truth. I wish to honour the bravery required to face threats and violence and the price paid for speaking out."







Ayman Al Gedi (Gaza)

On Christmas Day Ayman Al Gedi would have become a father for the first time. Ayman, 28, and four journalist colleagues were waiting outside the al-Awda hospital in the Nuseirat refugee camp where his wife was giving birth when an Israeli missile hit their clearly-marked press van. All five were killed. Ayman never met his son.

Mohammed Al-Ladaa (Gaza)

Colleagues and family called Fadi Hassouna's loss "immeasurable"; Mohammad Al Ladaa's professionalism "unmatched"; and Faisal Abu Al Qumsan "courageous". Ibrahim Sheik Ali's cousin paid tribute to the journalist, saying he "never gave up, no matter how difficult the circumstances."

Ismail Al Ghoul (Gaza)

Ismail Al-Ghoul, father to Zeina and husband to Malak, was a highly experienced journalist who began his career at the *Al-Risala* newspaper before moving into television reporting as an *Al Jazeera* Arabic correspondent. Cameraman Rami Al-Refee worked as a broadcast engineer at the Gazan Watania Media Agency.

The pair died in what Al Jazeera believes was a targeted drone attack on their vehicle. Seventeen journalists were killed by IDF drones in Gaza in 2024.

Hamza Al Dahdonh (Gaza)

Hamza Al-Dahdouh was killed by an Israeli drone while driving between Khan Younis and Rafah. He was the son of Al Jazeera Gaza bureau chief Wael Al-Dahdouh who remembered his son with love and pride: "Hamza was all mine. He was my breath, and he was my soul, but certainly this loss and this pain will not deter us from continuing to perform this duty." Wael's wife Amna, seven-year-old daughter Sham, 15-year-old son Mahmoud, and grandchild Adam were also killed by Israeli airstrikes.





Wafa Al-Udaini (Gaza)

Wafa Al-Udaini had worked as a journalist in Gaza since 2007 and her writing had been featured in the *Guardian* and the *Middle East Monitor*. Among her achievements was founding an organisation to train young Gazan writers and activists to work with English-language news organisations. Her house was hit by an Israeli airstrike, killing Wafa, her husband, their five-year-old daughter Balsam and their seven-month-old son Tamim.

Mohamed Yaghi (Gaza)

Yaghi was a freelance photojournalist who worked with Al-Jazeera and several other international news organizations. His father, Teshreen, said that Mohamed wanted to be a journalist since he was a young boy and loved his work. Mohamed was killed along with his wife Dania, their 18-month-old daughter Aylol and 34 other family members when an Israeli airstrike hit their home in Deir al-Balah, central Gaza.

Iman Al Shanti (Gaza)

Iman Al Shanti was a local radio journalist. She carried with her a "positivity, optimism, always looking at the glass half full" said a colleague. Iman was killed with her family in an Israeli airstrike on the Sheikh Radwan neighborhood in northern Gaza. Iman's brother Ahmed said the loss of his sister, nephews Bilal, 16, Omer, 8, and niece Alma, 6, is "beyond comprehension."





Mohammed Bassam Al-Jamal (Gaza)

Mohammad Bassam Al-Jama worked as a photographer for the news agency Palestine Now. He was killed after suffering critical injuries in an Israeli airstrike on his family home in the Al-Jenenah neighborhood in Rafah, southern Gaza. The strike on April 24 killed Mohammad and 5 of his relatives, including his young nephew Bassam and niece Shams.

Alaa Al-Hams (Gaza)

Alaa Al-Hams was a journalist for the local Palestinian News Agency SND. Having already suffered the deaths of 10 family members and a spinal injury in the previous month following an Israeli airstrike on Rafah, Alaa succumbed to her injuries on February 12. She was carrying her unborn child.

Nasrullah Gadani (Pakistan)

Nasrullah Gadani was on his way to the Press Club where he was president in the city of Mirpur Mathelo when he was shot three times by three assailants. A Pakistani newspaper described Nasrullah, a reporter for the Sindhi language newspaper Awami Awaz, as a 'herculean journalist'. He was "a vibrant and lone voice for the voiceless" in an area dominated by feudalism and corruption.







Ghassan Najjar (Lebanon)

Cameraman Ghassan Najjar was killed when an Israeli airstrike hit his guesthouse in Hasbaya, southern Lebanon in response to unsubstantiated IDF claims that the guesthouse was a Hezbollah military structure housing terrorists. Ghassan's wife Sana defiantly responded, "his weapon was his camera."

Jihan Belkin (Syria)

Jihan ('world' in Kurdish) was killed by a Turkish drone strike in northeastern Aleppo. "Our colleague Jihan has etched her name into the history of the Kurdish people. There was no city she hadn't visited, no leader she hadn't interviewed, and no military commander she hadn't engaged in discussions with. She became an icon of the struggle of her people's cause," wrote her colleagues at the Kurdish Hawar News Agency.

Abu Taher Turab (Bangladesh)

Abu Taher Turab, a reporter for the Daily Jalalabad and Daily Naya Diganta newspapers, was killed when police fired into a protest over government job quotas in the northeast city of Sylhet. Abu married his wife Tania Islam in May and had recently returned to work from his honeymoon.

Viktoria Roshchyna (Ukraine)

Ukrainian journalist Viktoria Roshchyna was captured by Russian forces and died in detention. She was a recipient of the International Women's Media Foundation's 2022 Courage in Journalism Award for her work in Russian-occupied eastern Ukraine. Explaining why she reported from behind the frontlines, Viktoria said, "there are no Ukrainian journalists there, but there are Ukrainian citizens so I should go."



Ryan Evans (UK)

Ryan Evans, a Reuters news media safety advisor, died when a missile hit his hotel in eastern Ukraine, where he was staying with his news team. Ryan had been to Ukraine more than 20 times since 2022 and was "indispensable to Reuters journalists on the frontlines," according to a colleague. "Are you ok?" was a question Ryan repeatedly asked his team, for whom he was an unfailing source of support. Ryan died doing a job he loved, protecting journalists. He left a wife and four children, the youngest just 18 months old.



Nikita Tsitsagi (Russia)

Treading the line between anti-war protest and maintaining a seat at Moscow-based news outlet News.ru, Nikita Tsitagi was an anomalous figure among Russian journalists. Nikita reported extensively from Russian-occupied Ukraine, particularly Donetsk. He was killed by a Ukrainian drone while travelling along the frontline towards Vuhledar.

Manricio Cruz Solís (Mexico)

"I have no words to tell you what I feel for my son. He was a great journalist who helped many people, but they cut his life short," said Mauricio Cruz Solís' grieving father. The director of the online news website Minuto x Minuto and an anchor for Radiorama Michoacan, Mauricio was shot dead by unidentified assailants in Uruapan. He was the first of two journalists killed during the first month of President Claudia Sheinbaum's administration.

Marckendy Nathoux and Jimmy Jean (Haiti)

Marckendy Nathoux and Jimmy Jean were killed on Christmas Eve when armed gang members opened fire on a government press conference at a hospital. Marckendy, a father of two, was multilingual and taught English and Spanish to help young Haitians expand their opportunities. He worked for the Voice of America, the Boston Caribbean Network and the US Agency for Global Media. Jimmy, a father of six, covered daily news for the online outlet Moun Afe Bon.
